








 - 2.1%





Hypertensive Disorders in Pregnancy

- Birth records from vital statistics and hospital discharge records from 2007-2012
- - Cadmium
 - Lead
 - Trihalomethane
 - Hexavalent chromium



How to address environmental justice and environmental racism in studies?

- Public data → Index of concentration of extremes
 - Racial/ethnic segregation and income inequality (Chambers et al. J Urban Health, 2019)
- Address multiple stressors
 - G-computation (Goin et al. Epidemiology, 2020)
- Ask policy relevant questions
 - Methods that estimate health effects associated with targeted changes at communities


