- EPA certified
 - 1988 to present
 - Limits fine particle pollution
 - tag on back
- WA Approved
 - Nearly 2X cleaner than EPA





• Uncertified – pre-1988











- Catalytic stoves
- Required to be almost 2X cleaner than non-catalytic stoves





- Catalytic stove
- Made in WA





- Non-catalytic
- Must burn hot with enough air to be clean





Pellet stoves

- Same emission standard as non-catalytic stoves
- Designed for complete combustion





Pellet stoves

• Free standing



Masonry fireplaces

- Currently exempt from air emission standards
- May heat a room but net heat loss





Manufactured fireplaces

- Must meet our state fireplace standard
- Limited features to reduce smoke






Uncertified fireplaces

Not legal for sale







What does the law say about what you can buy and install?

- Law restricts the seller
- Local air agencies and Ecology can issue fines for illegal sales
- Must be <u>both</u> EPA certified and WA approved



What does the law say about smoke?

- Limited Emissions
- Limited Smoke density





Certified, WA approved, but not legally operated







What does the law say about fuel?

- No garbage, treated or painted wood
- No plastics or petroleum products
- Nothing that emits dense smoke or obnoxious odors
- Properly seasoned fuel wood





What does the law say about burn bans?

- Based on weather and collected air samples
- Stage 1
 - No uncertified, no fireplaces
- Stage 2
 - No wood burning
 - Exempt: no other source of adequate heat





What happens if I don't follow these laws and rules?

- Air agencies have authority to issue fines
- Air quality may become unhealthy
- The community may take a financial hit



What is being done to address wood smoke?

- High standards
- Innovation
- Improved test methods
- Grants for vulnerable communities
- National dialogue
- Green Label
